Course Title: The Law of Treaties

Professor: Karl Zemanek

Purpose and summary of the course

The purpose of the course is to refine students' ability to identify and solve problems of treaty law. Since not all aspects of the law of treaties can be taught during the available time in class, this ability should enable students to deal with untreated problems that may arise in the course of their future professional work.

The course will be taught in an interactive manner, combining lectures and discussions. Compliance with the reading assignment **before** the respective lecture and active participation in its discussion in class are therefore indispensible for achieving the purpose of the course.
